### *From the desk of the Congregational Leader*

As I write this message, Sr Elly and I are in the middle of our Visitation in PNG. By the time you read it, we will be in the Philippines celebrating with our Filipina sisters the Golden Jubilee of our FDNSC foundation there. Deeply grateful for “*the great things the Lord has done for us,*” not only for the past 50 years but all throughout our history as a congregation, I wish you all a Happy Feast of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart!



In PNG, I found myself connecting with our early years. PNG was our first “mission” as a congregation. It is the mission that directly connects us to Fr Jules Chevalier, to Mother Marie Louise, and to our pioneer sisters. What an honour it is for us to walk in their footsteps and to continue the mission they began. As we visited FDNSC communities and ministries in PNG, we cannot but remember our beginnings and be filled with awe and gratitude! At the same time, we feel the weight of the responsibility we carry. We are the generation of FDNSCs called to live in a time of rapid change and to bring the congregation to a future yet unknown. The strength, courage and fidelity of all the sisters who have gone before us urge us on!

In the Philippines, we gratefully remember the first five FDNSCs who came to begin our mission in the country: one Australian, two Spanish and two Filipina sisters. One of them, Sr Lydia Dionisio, is still with us today, celebrating and enthusiastically sharing with everyone what it was like in the beginning.

Early in the year, we had our Visitation in South Sudan. Like our other missions, it is a gift of God to us. We thank our Australian Province which started the mission and our African Province which has brought it forward to this day. After much prayer and after consultation with the parties concerned, we have come to the decision to make the community in South Sudan directly under the Generalate effective 26 May 2018, Feast of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. This will be for a transition period of about three years (2018 to 2020). Two Indonesian sisters are currently being prepared to join Srs Wendy and Rita in the mission in Mapuordit. We thank our Indonesian Province for their courage and generosity. During this period of transition, our missionaries will endeavour to continue the work of empowering the people in Mapuordit while we as a congregation discern what God is calling us to beyond 2020. South Sudan and its people are close to the heart of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. The land was consecrated to her by St Daniel Comboni back in 1875 and so we are confident that Our Lady will keep South Sudan and its people under her loving care.



As we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart this year, we join Mary in her song of praise and thanksgiving to God for all the great things he has done for us! Sisters, I hold all of you in my heart and, with you, I am deeply grateful for the past, I proceed with courage in the present and I look to the future full of hope! Thank you for constantly accompanying me with your prayers.

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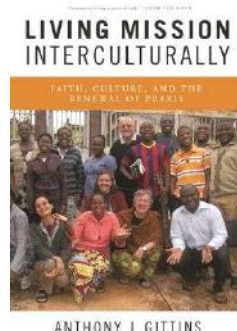

## Interculturality Workshop in Nemi

On 23 January Sr. Elly went to Nemi to participate in a two week course about interculturality. This course was organized by the Divine Word Missionaries who, together with their sister-congregation, the Holy Spirit Missionary Sisters, had had a similar workshop last year. Anthony Gittins CSSp was the main speaker. Since some of us at the Generalate had previously read his book "Living Mission Interculturally", it was an exciting prospect to meet him.

There were 51 participants, coming from 25 different countries! Most of them were General Superiors, General Councillors or Formators. Among them was Sr. Barbara Winkler, the Superior General of the MSC Sisters.



Some of the topics presented were: definitions and concepts of culture, interculturality, intercultural leadership, personality and culture, gender and culture, cultural differences, psychological and cultural responses to intercultural living - particularly in religious communities - and formation in interculturality. During the course the participants also had the opportunity to do an online interculturality test.

It was a great opportunity for Sr Elly to participate in this course. Now the challenge to each participant is to live and to share what they learned. Here at the Generalate we have already made a start. As one usually becomes more aware of one's own culture when in contact with another culture, we used one reflection day to draw an image of our own culture and to share about it in our community. Our conclusion was that we are really very different and it is really prophetic when we can live peacefully together and enrich one another.



During Sr. Marife and Sr Elly's visit to PNG and the Philippines, Sr. Elly gave some Conferences on the topic of interculturality. As in these countries sisters from many different cultures are living together, it was a very interesting and enriching experience. Within our international Congregation we are very blessed that we can learn a lot from one another!

## Rising from Wounds: Psychology and Spirituality Compared

This was the theme of the program that Sr Madeleine had the joy of participating in from February to March 2018 at the *Ateneo Pontificio Regina Apostolorum (Istituto Superiore di Scienze Religiose – APRA)* in Rome. The program was organized in cycles of conferences aimed primarily at the ongoing formation of religious and consecrated men and women.

The purpose of the course was to examine the wounds in the soul with the help of psychology, in the light of Holy Scripture and in the tradition of spiritual theology. God, the great physician of the soul, uses psychology, spiritual theology and Holy Scripture as sutures to heal our wounds. "For by his wounds we have been healed," says the prophet Isaiah (53.5). In addition, in confirmation of this prophecy, the Risen Jesus shows his wounds to his disciples. Every human

being, including consecrated persons, bears some physical, psychic, moral or spiritual wounds. In fact, every Christian suffers some wound that needs to be touched, healed, and transfigured by the grace of the Resurrection.

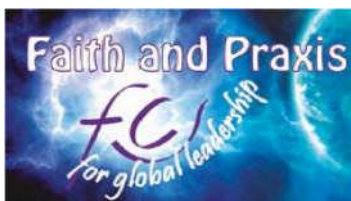
The consecrated person is the one who meets the signs of the Resurrection in his wounds; who can see the power of the Resurrection in the wounds of the world; who, like Jesus, does not go to meet his brothers with reproach and condemnation. Jesus Christ does not present himself to his disciples without wounds. In front of His wounds, Thomas confesses his faith. We are invited not to hide our sores. The awareness of having wounds frees us. We must find the courage to accept that a transfigured and resurrected wound can remain in us as a sign of God's mercy in our lives.



A Church with sores is able to understand the wounds of today's world and to make them its own. In fact, those who learn to look at their wounds as signs of Resurrection will be able to see the wounds of the world with the vision of divine mercy. As the Apostle John says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but to save the world through him" (Jn 3: 16-17).

We are called to accompany our brothers and sisters and try to heal them by showing them our compassionate love and our closeness. Because a Church with sores does not stand at the centre, cannot believe itself perfect, but it puts at the centre the only one who can heal wounds and He has a name: Jesus Christ.

## FACILITATORS' SEMINAR



This year, 2018, Sr Merle is attending a seminar/workshop for facilitators offered by *Faith and Praxis* and *The Craighead Institute*. The sessions are held at the UISG Building in Rome and they run from January to December, divided in two-day modules. There are 19 participants in

The process used in the seminar really provides for learning. One of the facilitators of the seminar is Sr Piluca MSOLA. She facilitated our 2017 General Conference. The main facilitator is Mr Colin Quine. Here is a brief description of the seminar as well as the schedule and titles of the modules.

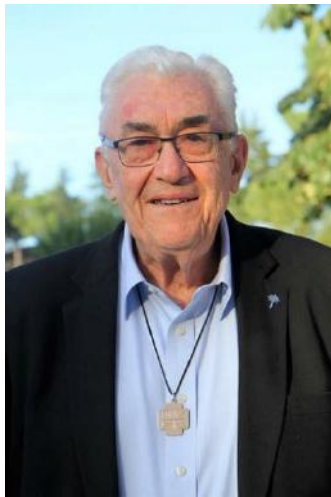
## First meeting of three Superiors General in 2018: Welcoming Fr Abzalón and thanking Fr Mark

On 19 January 2018, Sr Marife welcomed Sr Barbara Winkler, MSC Sisters' Superior General, Fr Mark McDonald, MSC former Superior General and Fr Abzalón Alvarado Tovar, MSC Superior General, to the first meeting of the Chevalier Family Superiors' General for 2018. This first meeting was held at the FDNCS Generalate and was facilitated by Sr Marife. It was a time to welcome Fr Abzalón to the team and to thank Fr Mark for his 12 fruitful years of being part of the team. The FDNCS Generalate Community was happy to then welcome the group to a sumptuous lunch prepared by Marjeta, our cook. Little did we know that, for some of us, this would be the last time we would see Fr Mark.



## Farewell to Fr Mark

On 13<sup>th</sup> February, the day before the beginning of the Lenten Season, the MSC Generalate community organised a farewell for Fr Mark McDonald at the MSC Generalate in Via Asmara. Fr Mark was scheduled to leave Rome for the USA a few days later. The celebration began with a Mass followed by lunch and refreshments. At that time, the community was sending him off to his new community and mission. A little less than two months later, on 4 April, we were again invited to the MSC Generalate in honour of Fr Mark; this time to join the MSC Community in the celebration of a memorial mass of thanksgiving for his life. Two days earlier, in the morning of Easter Monday, he was found dead in his room in Sacred Heart Villa in Centre Valley, Pennsylvania. He was 75



years of age. Fr Mark was buried in the town where he was born, Watertown, New York, on 9 April. Sr Linda Strayer was able to attend his funeral and represent us there. Although the news of his death came as a shock to us all, it was a consolation to realize that he died very peacefully on the most important day of the liturgical year - he died on Easter Sunday! To us, a beautiful assurance that he is now with the Risen Christ, forever living in His Heart! Thank you, Fr Mark! Rest in Peace!

## Welcoming Sr Anne Gardiner and Sr Mary Stevens to Rome

Recently we were delighted to welcome Sr Anne Gardiner and Sr Mary Stevens of the Australian Province to Rome. Sr Anne had been invited by the Australian Embassies to the Holy See and to Italy, to deliver the International Women's Day address on 8<sup>th</sup> March. Sr Anne, the 2017 Senior Australian of the Year, travelled from the Tiwi Islands in the Northern Territory to Rome for this important occasion. Sr Mary Stevens, who has also worked for many years in the Northern Territory, travelled with Sr Anne.



At the age of 22 years, Sr Anne went to Bathurst Island to live among the Tiwi people. At the age of 86, Sr Anne still lives among the Tiwi people. She told us that it was an extreme honour to deliver the International Women's Day address, and to have the opportunity to visit the Vatican. In her own words, Sr Anne said "The Senior Australian of 2017 Award does not belong to me alone. It belongs to my Sisters

who have worked in the Northern Territory for over one hundred years ministering to the remote Indigenous people."

Sr Anne and Sr Mary were accommodated at Domus Australia, which was officially opened by Pope Benedict in 2011. In recognition of her contribution to the Indigenous people, a section of Domus Australia is named after Sr Anne. We welcomed the Sisters to the Generalate for lunch one day and we also had a day out with them, sharing a meal and doing some sight-seeing in the Eternal City. The visit of Sr Anne and Sr Mary was a joyful time for them and also for us!



## Holy Week and Easter in Dublin

Recently I visited our Sisters in Ireland, a country which is also known as the Emerald Isle because of its beautiful green countryside. I was made very welcome to our convent in Templeogue, a suburb of Dublin, by Sr Mairead, Sr Fachanan and Sr Vianney who form the community there. Like many Australians, my family heritage goes back to Ireland, and this gives me an additional sense of being at home whenever I visit.



We attended the Easter ceremonies at the parish Church of St Jude. The choir made an especially beautiful contribution to each of the liturgies. We were invited to the MSC community for Easter Sunday lunch, which was a happy time for us all.

## The Visitation in South Sudan – 14 to 23 February 2018

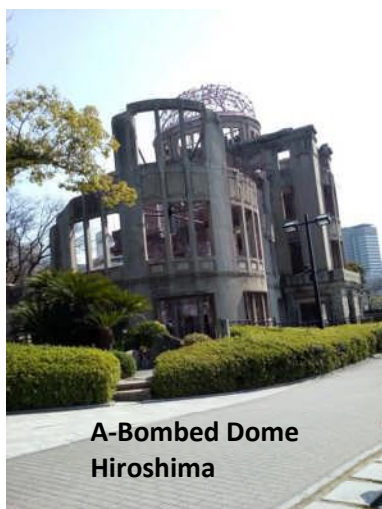

## Annual Visit to the Japan Community – 2 to 16 March 2018

This year, in January, Sr Leonila dela Pena, has started her 3-year mandate as leader of the FDNSC Community in Japan. She follows Sr Cecilia Takara who was community leader for four terms (2005 to 2017). Sr Leon, as she prefers to be called, is the third community leader in Japan since its beginnings, the first having been Sr Mary Fyfe (1995 to 2005). At the moment, we have 6 sisters in Japan. Sr Akie is on exclaustation and 5 sisters are living in community. Three are in Nagoya (Sr Cecilia, Sr Narie and Sr Moia) and two are in Fukui (Sr Leon and Sr Mangarita). The sisters from the two houses consider themselves one community and so they have many of their community activities together. The main focus of this year's visit was for Sr Merle to share with the community the experience and the fruits of the 2017 General Conference. It was also a time to have individual talks with the sisters and gather to meet as a community to talk about various concerns of the community and of the sisters at this time.



Sr Merle's visit this year had a special feature, a pilgrimage to Hiroshima with Sr Cecilia. The very first atomic bomb was dropped on the city of Hiroshima on 6 August 1945 at exactly 08:15 am, Hiroshima time. To see the memorabilia from the atomic bomb in the Museum in Hiroshima was a

heart-rending experience – a burnt watch that stopped at 08:15; a burnt bike of a 3-year old boy who was on his bike in front of their house when the bomb struck; badly burnt clothes of men, women and children; glass bottles that the extreme heat had melted and deformed...the list goes on and on. Three days after Hiroshima was bombed, a second atomic bomb was dropped by the US, this time on the city of Nagasaki. After seeing the instant and massive destruction caused by the bomb in Hiroshima (US military men were in Hiroshima on 8 August), it is impossible to understand why a second bomb was dropped!!!! **NO MORE HIROSHIMAS!** This is the message from the people of Hiroshima to the whole world. It



was the message ringing in Sr Merle's heart as she left the place. Let us not just pray for peace, let us be bearers and makers of peace!

Sr Laurentia, our General Bursar, is currently preparing for our first International Meeting of FDNSC Bursars in Rome. She is being assisted by Sr Jenny and Sr Merle in the preparations. The meeting is scheduled for 3 to 14 December 2018. About 25 are expected to participate. Most will be bursars. Some leaders are also coming, as well as lay finance managers. The meeting is taking as its theme the title of the latest document from CICLSAL: ***Economy at the Service of the Charism and Mission***. Sisters, please include this meeting in your prayers.





# Happenings in Rome



## UISG Rome Constellation Meeting – 10 to 11 January 2018

The members of the UISG (the International Union of Women Superiors General) who are based in Rome have an annual “constellation” meeting. This year, it was held at Monte Cucco on January 10 and 11 with the theme *Weaving Hope and Prophecy in Our World Today*. On the dates of the meeting, Sr Marife was in the Philippines so Sr Merle attended on her behalf. The meeting was attended by 80 sisters, mostly superiors general. There were conferences, group workshops and plenary discussions in the very full 2-day meeting. The two guest speakers, both from CICLSAL, developed the theme. Sr Nicla Spezzati spoke on *The Prophecy of Consecrated Life* and Monsignor Jose Carballo OFM spoke on *Religious Women as Weavers of Hope*. In the evening of day 1 of the meeting, a lay journalist presented a very interesting video project that she did with different religious congregations (men and women) in Italy. She shared that she and her team asked religious superiors in Italy to think of a project or ministry of their congregation that they are really proud of. The team then chose a number of the “stories” submitted and made short videos which were then shown on Italian TV. The videos show the many varied ways by which we, religious, are truly weavers of hope and prophecy in our world today. The videos are on YouTube, just search *Varchi di Luce*. Maria Sagrario had visited in February to prepare for this visit of Mother Maria Marta. She also invited us to come and visit their community in Rome. We thank God for the gift of this visit and for opening a new door between our congregations at this time!



## Lent, Holy Week and Easter in Rome

This year, Lent began on 14 February, Valentines' Day. We went into the beautiful 40-day season of prayer as the world celebrated the day of lovers! And what a good day to begin Lent because what is Lent but a season when we prepare to celebrate the greatest love of all – the Love of Jesus - expressed in his life, death and resurrection! Here in Rome, Pope Francis started us off on our Lenten journey with his Lenten message released on 6 February in which he said *"I urge the members of the Church to take up the Lenten journey with enthusiasm, sustained by almsgiving, fasting and prayer. If, at times, the flame of charity seems to die in our own hearts, know that this is never the case in the heart of God! He constantly gives us a chance to begin loving anew."*



How true! God indeed constantly gives us a chance to begin loving anew. This year, He did this by sending the city of Rome a beautiful and rare surprise...SNOW! In the morning of 26 February, we woke up to see our garden covered with snow. Since this happens very rarely in Rome (the last time being 6 years ago), the whole city was excited. Residents of the eternal city, young and old, went out and played in the snow! The internet was

flooded with photos and videos of the snow in Rome. With all the excitement brought by the snow, we enthusiastically continued on our Lenten journey.

As the month of March came, we thanked God for the fast recovery of Sr Elena, our Italian sister who helps out in the Generalate. She had had a fall in January. Thank God, she is better now. On 13 March, we celebrated her birthday as well as the birthday of Marjeta, our beautiful lay cook. Lent was a time to thank God for the gift of the people who serve us so lovingly.

Before we knew it, we had entered Holy Week. Sr Elly went to the Dutch Church, where she serves in the choir, for all the

liturgical services, from Palm Sunday to the Easter Sunday. Sr Madeleine led the singing in the Palm Sunday and Easter Triduum celebrations in the chapel of our Italian sisters, a service she lovingly renders and which is deeply appreciated by our Italian sisters. This year, Sr Madeleine also attended the Good Friday Stations of the Cross at the Colosseum with thousands of others, pilgrims, Romans, tourists and faithful, as well as the Easter Vigil Mass at the French Church. The rest of us attended the English celebrations at the Caravita and St Patrick's Church. Except for Sr Jenny who was in Ireland during that time, we all gathered together in the dining room of our Italian Sisters for lunch on Easter Sunday to celebrate the Rising of Our Lord!

On Easter Morning, we woke up to the fullness of God's love as we listened to Pope Francis' Message to the City of Rome and to the whole World (*Urbi et Orbi*). He said:

We Christians believe and know that Christ's resurrection is the true hope of the world, the hope that does not disappoint. It is the power of the grain of wheat, the power of that love which humbles itself and gives itself to the very end, and thus truly renews the world. This power continues to bear fruit today in the furrows of our history, marked by so many acts of injustice and violence. It bears fruits of hope and dignity where there are deprivation and exclusion, hunger and unemployment, where there are migrants and refugees (so often rejected by today's culture of waste), and victims of the drug trade, human trafficking and contemporary forms of slavery.

Let us allow ourselves to be used by the Risen Lord as instruments of His power that renews the world!

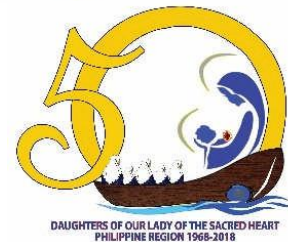
